In these circumstances the task of government is extraordinarily complex and the response of health services, carers, volunteers and businesses in adapting to changing times, is magnificent and humbling.

I confess to being unable to express anything that might help in making sense of what we are all going through, there are no easy words, and these are not normal times. However, what I do see and hear about, is the generosity and ingenuity of people. That, I can understand, appreciate and say thank you!

Thank you for the support of one another in our communities; thank you for the selfless commitment of NHS and care staff in their caring and in their compassion; and thank you too for the clever people who know how to make social media work for good and communicate and encourage us with tweets, face time, videos etc... THANK YOU ALL.

When thinking about how I might characterise what I wanted to say in this letter, I thought of an image. The image is a hand, or hands. Beautiful, craggy, young, old, frail and strong hands. These hands of ours, that have been washed and washed again, because that is how we can help stop the spread of the virus.

Hands that reach out to offer support and help to those unable to get out. Hands that reach for the phone to talk to someone who might otherwise be lonely and alone. Hands too that hold and cuddle those closest to us when we are most frightened and many of us are now frightened and confused.

The Easter story of new life emerging out of death is so profoundly symbolic of all that we cling too, in this time of confusion and loss. In these dark moments, it is a story of hope and love in the midst of human chaos and pain.

It begins with rough hands that nail a broken body to a wooden cross. Hands that bore that broken body down from the cross and carried it the tomb. Despairing hands, wiping away the tears.

Yet, early in the morning, a woman's hands, that so wanted to grasp and hold the Lord she loved, were gently rebuffed, "*Jesus said to her, "Mary."*

*She turned and said to Him in Aramaic, "Rabboni!" (which means "Teacher").*

**17** "*Do not cling to Me,*" Jesus said, "*for I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go and tell My brothers, 'I am ascending to My Father and your Father, to My God and your God.'*"

**18** *Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord!" And she told them what He had said to her.* JOHN 20. 16-18.

My words remain inadequate. I find that I am still confused and a little frightened for us all. Yet, I trust still, in the love and compassion of human beings. I trust too in the love of God and of his son Jesus Christ, with whom and in the Spirit the story continues. Love conquers all. May we hold onto that, today and in the days to come.

## ULEY ARCHIVES (Memories)

There used to be three Churches in Uley. The present St. Giles Church stands on the site of the original Parish Church. By the 1850's this was in a state of dilapidation and dampness and so in 1857 it was decided to demolish the old Church and build a new one. The foundation stone was laid on 15<sup>th</sup> May 1857 and the new Church was consecrated on 28<sup>th</sup> September 1858 by the Lord Bishop of Gloucester & Bristol. The total cost of the building was £2,958. Whitecourt (Union) Chapel was opened in 1791 and Bethesda, (built by the Baptists) in Clapgate Lane (now South Street) in 1838. By 1971 both chapels were closed and subsequently used for other purposes.

Now to everyday life. Most families were large with some having as many as eight children. There was no water in the houses, a few had pumps & wells but most collected rainwater in a tank or butt for the weekly wash. Reg tells us that Monday was always wash day which required Robin Starch, the Blue Bag, and plenty of elbow grease! Some people had a mangle with big rollers.

Paraffin & candles were the only lighting. There were no sewers, the toilet closet or privy was usually at the bottom of the garden screened by bushes or trees. The earth buckets were usually emptied on a moonlit night! There were no bathrooms either, a large tin bath was put in front of the fire and filled with the water heated in the copper. The young ones were bathed two at a time and the older ones had their bath when the youngsters had gone to bed. Reg says that by the time he got married the mains water & sewers were brought to the village, he was one of the first to be connected, the Chairman of the Parish Council, opened a bottle of Champagne and declared the sewer open by pulling his flush in 1951.

Most families grew their own produce as the cottage gardens tended to be quite large. Some kept fowl or a pig in the sty. These were fattened and killed for home use. There were also plenty of rabbits both tame & wild.

Reg recalled the girls at school wearing long white pinafores over their dresses and black stockings. The boys wore knickerbockers or short trousers and stockings which were turned down at the top. Both girls & boys wore lace-up boots,

some covered with hob nails or studs for those boys playing football. Other games were marbles, whip-tops, rounders, tag & conkers. You were banned if you had baked your conker beforehand and there was always a fight or two. Reg mentioned a boy called Harry Tilley who used to hang around the playground because no school would have him.

His father was a builder and they lived at Fountain Villa, (now demolished) at the entrance to Green Close. They could do nothing with this boy at home, he would let the pigs out, take his father's horse & go out hunting. The family eventually moved to Mutterall Farm where Harry knocked all the taps out of the cider casks and all the cider was lost down the drain!

The top row of houses at Lampern View were the first to have tap water laid on. They did not have toilets or baths as the main sewer had not yet been laid there. A lot of the old cottages were knocked down and the people moved into council properties. The rents were about twelve shillings a week. Reg himself bought three cottages together in Fop Street for £260 in 1930, a lot of money when he only earned £3 a week! He paid twelve shillings a week mortgage and two shillings a week insurance for twelve years.

Uley was always fortunate to have a resident Doctor & surgery. Dr Campbell lived at Rose Villa in The Street (now known as Peopance) and was possibly the first person to own a motor car in Uley. His wife, Mrs Adele Campbell bred poultry & ducks, notably her development of the Khaki Campbells (1901).

Dr Campbell was followed by Dr. Hoskin who held his surgery in a wooden hut. You were never prescribed tablets, the 'tonic' was always in a bottle and you were expected to take an empty bottle with you. The next doctor was Dr. J.P. Huins, his surgery was in the cottage of Raglan House. He had served in both world wars and was awarded the Croix de Guerre. He died on 2<sup>nd</sup> May 1975 aged 77 years.

The porch gates of St. Giles Church were dedicated on Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> October 1978 in memory of James Proctor Huins, 1899-1976, a "beloved physician" of Uley.

## A MAY LETTER FROM TONY KING

Dear Friends,

As I write we have been living under extraordinary circumstances for nearly three weeks – I have to say it already seems much longer! One of the worst aspects is the isolation – cut off from our families, both natural and church. It seems so strange to know that our churches, for many of us a real hub, are closed, locked and always empty. Instead we are running online services using Zoom – see our website [ewelmebenefice.co.uk](http://ewelmebenefice.co.uk) for details. But amidst all the bad news with rising infection and death rates, and problems with PPE and testing kits, there are glimmers of good news – the army of people volunteering to help, people using their skills to help others – even our friendly neighbour who is shopping for us.

And the signs of spring and new life are all around us – our weeping cherry tree was a mass of white blossom; birds are collecting twigs from our drive to build their nests: plants (and weeds) are springing up.

Perhaps May will bring better news – we can only pray that it will – and the church calendar offers encouragement as well. We will have followed our Lord Jesus through the solemnity and sadness of Holy Week and the joyfulness of Easter Day – muted though it will be this year. By the start of May, we will be three weeks into Eastertide with Ascension Day and the Feast of Pentecost to come.

Ascensiontide, the period between the two events, is a time of waiting for the coming of the Holy Spirit and some Protestant denominations observe it as another period of fasting like Lent. Despite the nine day difference, Ascension and Pentecost are closely linked – the risen Lord is no longer present to the Church in the body of his flesh; the Church is now to be the new body of Christ, filled with his life through the gift of the Spirit, sent by God to empower the Church to perform the mission which the risen Christ had entrusted to it. Pentecost celebrates both the Holy Spirit and the Christian Church. It was originally the crown and completion of the Easter season; only later, in the medieval West, did it become a new festival season of its own. No matter how things develop throughout May this year, as we celebrate Pentecost on the last day of the month, we shall be able to say – if only through our computers, tablets and phones...

‘Alleluia, alleluia.

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful people and kindle in them the fire of your love. **Alleluia.**’


